Highlights

• In this release, the Ontario Court of Appeal, in J.F.R. v. K.L.L. (2024), 1 R.F.L. (9th) 255 (Ont. C.A.), held that the adult child of the marriage was entitled to be herd in a parenting application that materially impacted him. Here, the adult child was disabled and the initial hearing his views were presented through a social worker and in a report. However, on appeal, this was considered an inadequate recognition of the natural justice principle of audi alteram partem and the adult child's fundamental right to be heard. The principle of *audi alteram partem* outlined in J.F.R. v. K.L.L. has been applied in other proceedings involving adult children regardless of their circumstances.
