What's New in this Update:

- Reference should be had to *R. v. Hodgson*, 2024 SCC 25, in which the court provided important clarification of the strict statutory limitations on the Crown's right of appeal against an acquittal under s. 676 limitations that largely derive from foundational principles of double jeopardy.
- Further, in *R. v. Foreshaw* (2024), 434 C.C.C. (3d) 527, 2024 ONCA 177 (Ont. C.A.), the court held that it is permissible under s. 12 of the *Canada Evidence Act* to cross-examine a witness on a conviction for which a record suspension has been granted under the *Criminal Records Act*. Unlike a free pardon under s. 748 of the Code, a record suspension does not deem that the offender never committed the offence.
- Finally, in *R. v. N.G.* (2024), 434 C.C.C. (3d) 473, 2024 ONCA 20 (Ont. C.A.), the court provided informative guidance on the application of the regime for admission of electronic documents in ss. 31-31.8 of the *Canada Evidence Act*. The court held that the trial judge did not err in refusing to admit text messages from the complainant's cell phone where the phone had been stolen by the accused.
