Highlights

New features and recent developments in this 2024-2025 Edition include:

- *Midson v. Meeting House Lane Medical Practice*, a Second Department decision discussing whether it is proper to allege vicarious liability in the bill of particulars. See §§ 1:2 and 1:6.
- *DiMaggio v. Port Authority of New York and New Jersey*, a First Department case discussing demands for authorization. See § 1:26.
- *Morrison v. South Union RD HC, LLC*, a Fourth Department case holding that failing to raise the Workers' Compensation Law defense in the pleadings or bill of particulars does not waive its reliance on that defense. See § 3:3.
- *Wagner v. Parker*, a Second Department matter opining that a defendant moving for summary judgment must make a prima facie showing either that there was no departure from accepted medical practice, or that any departure was not a proximate cause of the patient's injuries. See § 4:11.
- *People v. Seignious*, a Court of Appeals decision finding that the bill of particulars may restrict the prosecution's theory of the crime to such an extent that an appropriate limitation on the jury charge is required. See § 8:1.
