CERCLA: EPA designates perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctanesulfonic acid (PFOS) as CERCLA hazardous substances. Clarification of standard for “arranger” liability by Fourth Circuit. New opinions regarding scope of exemption for federally permitted releases, CERCLA’s bar on double recovery. Interior Department proposal to update Type A Rule for assessment of natural resource damages.

New Jersey Environmental Law: Appellate Division addresses procedural requirements for rescission of remediation-in-progress waiver under Industrial Site Recovery Act. DEP proposes far-reaching changes to wetlands, flood hazard, and stormwater regulations. New Jersey expands regulation of poly- and perfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS).
